If you're 21–24 years old, most of the companies will rent to you, but you'll pay about \$25 extra *per day* for the crime of being young and reckless. If you're under 21—rent a bike or moped or take the bus. Below are a few tips to keep in mind when you rent your car on Kaua'i.

- Many **Collision Damage Waivers** will not cover vehicles on unpaved roads or beaches. Consider this when driving on dirt cane roads or at Polihale.
- **Seat belt** use and **child restraints** are required by law and police will stop you for this alone.

Car break-ins can be a problem anywhere. They seem to be more frequent in the summer due to school vacations. The places usually hit are those that require you to leave your car in a secluded place for an extended period of time. Contrary to popular belief, locals are targeted nearly as often as tourists. To protect yourself, don't leave anything valuable in the car. (Well...maybe the seats can stay.) At secluded spots that have recently been robbed, savvy locals will often leave their doors unlocked and the windows partially open to prevent having their windows smashed. If you park in a secluded spot and notice several piles of glass on the ground, leave your windows rolled down a little—broken glass is evidence that some juvenile has a new hobby. Don't kid yourself into believing that trunks are safe—they are

often easier to open than doors. One place thieves rarely look is under the hood. But don't put something there after you arrive at your destination since someone might be watching. We once drove up to the parking area at Secret Beach, and there was a suspicious looking guy there. 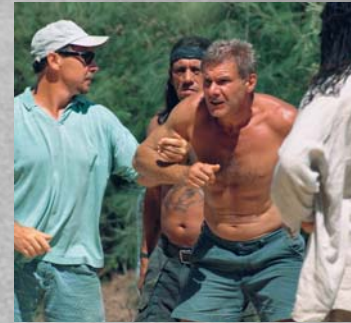

4-Wheel Drive

With its many rugged roads, one of the best ways to see Kaua'i is by four-wheel drive. These can be difficult to come by at times. Ask if they have disabled the 4WD mechanism. If you use a gold credit card for the automatic insurance, check with the card carrier to see if you are covered when you're on unpaved roads. Another tip is to avoid deep, soft sand. Even 4WD vehicles can get stuck in sand if they have the wrong tires. If you must drive on sand, let much of the air out of the tires to get more sand traction. (We'll leave it up to you how to get the air back in.) If you already *are* stuck in sand, try pulling the carpet from the trunk and driving on it to get out. (Oh, the car companies will love us for *that* one.) Rental car companies are always changing the vehicles to keep them new. At press time, all the *big* companies we list had SUVs or other 4WD vehicles.
